3	Daily program is arranged so that: each child over 18 months of age and up to and including 5 years that is in attendance for 6 hours or more in a day has a rest period not exceeding two hours in length following mid-day meal.			
4	Daily program is arranged so that: each child under 30 months of age that is in attendance for six hours or more in a day is outdoors for play or sleep or both for up to two hours per day, weather permitting, unless a physician or parent of the child advises otherwise in writing.			

5	Daily program is arranged so that: a child under 44 months of age as of August 31 of the year who is unable to sleep during the rest period is not kept in bed longer than 1 hour and is permitted to engage in quiet activities.			
6	Daily program is arranged so that: a child 44 months of age or over and up to and including 67 months of age as of August 31 st of the year and who is unable to sleep during the rest period is permitted to engage in quiet activities.			
7	Daily program is arranged so that: the daily program includes outdoor play for each child over 30 months of age in attendance for 6 or more hours.			
8	There are no more than 5 daycare children (under the age of 10) in attendance at any one time.			
9	The number of children receiving care, including the children of the person in charge who are under 6 years of age, does not exceed 5.			
10	In addition to above, the number of children in each of the following groups is not exceeded at any one time: -two children with special needs Two children under 2 years of age Three children under three years of age One child with special needs and one child under two years of age.			
11	Every child in attendance is supervised by an adult at all times (An adult is a person 18 years of age or older).

9	cradle or bed. (Cradles and cribs must comply with the standards	
	contained in the Hazardous Products Act.)	
10	There is bedding for each child that stays in this private-home day

	If an enrolled child is transported in a vehicle by the caregiver, child	
11	seating and restraint systems used are: based on the birth date, age,	
	height or weight of the child.	
	If an enrolled child is transported in a vehicle by the caregiver, child
